



It is only by your participation and desires that the newsletter can be informative and useful to keep the Association alive. Please send a line with your comments on life, and the newsletter. Also welcome are sub stories, or your own input for inclusion.

Donors, Money, Govt. rules, the Patriot Act

Over time, there have been many donors with funds helping to keep the Sabalo Association alive. Many to myself and many to the support of Ron Gorence's publication of the *CB* for 9 years.

My hobby of tracking Sabalo sailors evolved from just trying to find a few shipmates I served with, into an effort to encompass the full time and history of Sabalo's existence. Overtime, with help and input from so many, the web site and our newsletter is a model for any ship out there and very few have the same quality and content.

As a hobby, I expect no monetary input, and the Association has never been constructed to have a membership fee or the burden of official officers and such. Some boats and surface craft do have such associations with dues of \$25 a year and more. For the Sabalo Association, input is strictly based on volunteerism. I only relate this to explain the informality of the Association structure.

The expenses initially included long distance phone calls, which numbered more than a hundred many months in the beginning. The explicit expense was eliminated by getting an unlimited long distance package for my phone service which was not an offering in the early years of this century.

Once it seemed like organizing a reunion was the thing to do, I went to the bank to set up a separate account. It was soon after that I discovered that the Patriot Act made that a big hassle. (for more on the subject see page 5.) Because everything was informal, and also anonymous for where funds came from, I never acknowledged donors by name in the early newsletters. When Ron Gorence became chief editor, he did list donors. I am going to return to that policy with this issue.

This is not a plea for contributions. Should any money be needed I will send out word. If you feel inclined, I will accept same any time and add it to the funds. <u>THANK YOU to all who have</u> supported the Association and the newsletter for all interested to be included.

Another Reunion?

The question continues to pop up from a few guys. There are a few points of consideration that can be discussed.

In the *Mailbag*, I included an answer to Charlie Grubbs that includes info about men who have never been contacted that might include a few who would be interested in a reunion The main excuse offered by many who are on the current list with known whereabouts is that health and age preclude travel. The second factor is expense. Travel and lodging is the biggest cost, and that does have some consideration for many who might wish to attend. Arranging room discounts and banquet cost for a group, along with other amenities requires minimum numbers for the host hotel to offer discount packages. While 50 is common, some smaller places can work with less numbers. The current situation is that drawing enough attendees is probably not possible to meet hotel norms. Smaller places mean smaller cities and maybe less attractions. Any comments or ideas that might be fruitful can be discussed.

Editorial Comment- COVID-19 – It's mentioned 24/7 on every communication medium around the world, so I will make only one observation. The last two facts below, upon examination, reveal the two real distressing observations about government and news media pronouncements that all citizens should stock up on six weeks of food supplies (or whatever varying and unrealistic amount cannot be agreed upon).

My wife sometimes asks me what does it mean to be rich. I'll never reach whatever is the U.S. standard, but we in this country are richer than 75% of the rest of the world, even those who are poor here have more than the abject poor of other countries with -- No welfare, no food stamps or free cell phones. While I don't have a fortune, I'm glad I don't fall into any of these categories:

- Almost half of all Americans (<u>47 percent</u>) do not put a single penny out of their paychecks into savings.
- According to the CDC, <u>34.6 percent</u> of all men in the U.S. are obese.
- <u>48 percent</u> of all Americans do not have any emergency supplies in their homes what so ever. Even fewer have fire extinguishers.
- If you have no debt <u>and</u> also have 10 dollars in your wallet ... you are wealthier than <u>25 percent</u> of all Americans.

\$\$ HOW DOES THE ASSOCIATION GET FUNDS ?

I recently received a donation check made out to "USS Sabalo Association". In reply to explain why this check cannot be cashed, I wrote the donor an explanation. Upon thinking about the background information (and because he is not the first guy to send me a check to the "Association"), I thought I would explain for all, and include some info as a sort of financial report and status update on where the Sabalo Association stands and how things might go in the future. –[ed.]

<u>HISTORY</u>- The Patriot Act passed in 2001 by President Bush was supposed to hinder terrorists, and maybe has done so. However, the provisions relating to keeping funds from going to terrorist causes overseas seem to burden citizens more than the bad guys who have kept one step ahead of the law. [Likewise for the unknowns who contribute to political campaigns.]

One big program instituted by the Act was the control over bank accounts and who owns them. In the 'old days' you could walk into a bank and set up an account for the 'East Side Bowling League' or 'Jeff's Christmas Fund'; fill out a signature card; make the minimum deposit, and were issued a book of checks, and off you go.

Today, you are required to prove who you are with photo and social security ID. If you try to open an account in a nonpersonal entity name, you have to register with the government by getting an "Employer Identification Number (EIN)" and filling out a form providing information about just what you are engaged in.

Subsequently, should your account show activity more than \$600 per year, it is required that the proper forms (just like personal income tax) be filed showing whether any income may be taxable, and if so, the tax is due.

How do I know this? In 2002 when I began to organize the Sabalo reunion for 2003 in Reno, I established such an account in the name of "The USS Sabalo Association". Then, as I began to receive materials from the IRS, I found out that recordkeeping and annual filing requirement was a ridiculous burden considering the amount of money involved, and then closed the account.

There were some sizable funds collected at various times, even for the 2003 reunion which wasn't that big. However, the problem is collected funds would be subject to income tax in that year unless you are an IRS-recognized non-profit organization. So funds collected in 2002 would have been subject to tax in that year, and then the next year that tax could be recouped by

showing the funds were expended for reunion items. I won't even get into all of what that involves. In summation, it was a total B.S. situation considering the needs of the Association. So I surrendered the EIN and handle all monies in my personal account.

<u>ASSOCIATION FINANCES</u>- I carefully account for the amounts collected and use the small surplus from any reunion or donations, and small profits from ship store items, strictly for Sabalo related expenses: the web site, newsletter or other mail costs.

The website and domain name host was just paid in February w/ \$180 for another year. The current funds on hand are about \$300, so the next couple issues of the CleverBoy are covered thanks to recent donations.

Extra funds to cover expenses have mostly been received as spontaneous contributions from shipmates. At times, the short fall for any expenses were covered by myself or Ron Gorence. (I tell my wife it's a cheaper hobby than hanging out at the local watering hole.)

The expenditure for the newsletter in January was about \$1.88 for each copy of the 50 newsletters printed and mailed.

<u>"SAILING LIST"</u>, i.e. the Sabalo database- I have recently instituted a comprehensive and final

review to try one last time to establish the whereabouts of the of the ~272 men either never located or lost contact. Over the years of continuously updating and reviewing the list, I find many men who I'm pretty sure have been previously contacted, many more than once. However, they choose to not respond. Considering this, and because some listed as not located have little online clues or information to find them, or maybe have such a common name that narrowing it down is problematic, I have decided this recent effort is my last try to include anymore additions to the address list.

An unfortunate side result has been that for some men, the first item I find on the 'net for them is their obituary. For those who have been found and enjoyed knowing what happened to the big black boat they called home for a while, or made contact with an old shipmate, this has been the whole point of the exercise.—Jeff



BLUE WATER NAVY-AGENT ORANGE UPDATE

Exposure to Agent Orange has special meaning for Sabalo Vets who visited the Tonkin Gulf. Numerous incidences of rare and common cancers have been reported.

WHAT IS AGENT ORANGE? *THE BASICS*- Agent Orange is the name used to describe a particular type of herbicide blend used for military, tactical purposes in Vietnam from 1962 to 1975. The military sprayed millions of gallons of Agent Orange and other tactical herbicides on trees and vegetation to kill unwanted plants and remove leaves from trees which otherwise provided cover for the enemy. Agent

Orange was a reddish-brown to tan colored liquid. The name "Agent Orange" came from the orange stripe on the 55-gallon drums in which it was stored. Other herbicides, including Agent White and Agent Blue, were used in Vietnam to a much smaller extent.

Veterans who may have been exposed to Agent Orange include Veterans who were in Vietnam, the Korean Demilitarized Zone, on Thai Air Force bases, and who flew on or worked on C-123 Aircraft. Several decades later, concerns about the health effects from these chemicals, including dioxin, a byproduct of Agent Orange production, continue.

Agent Orange was a mixture of chemicals containing nearly equal amounts of the two active ingredients, 2,4-D (2,4-Dichlorophenoxyacetic acid) and 2,4,5-T (2,4,5-

Trichlorophenoxyacetic acid). These weed-killing chemicals were widely used commercially and privately in the United States and in many other countries from the 1940's into the 1970's.

During the manufacture of one of these ingredients, 2,4,5-T, a contaminant 2,3,7,8-tetracholordibenzo-p-dioxin or TCDD (commonly called "dioxin") also was produced in minute quantities. Although there are actually a series of closely related dioxin chemical compounds, TCDD has been the most extensively examined in animals and in humans and is thought to be the most toxic members of the dioxin chemical family.

VA offers eligible Veterans a free Agent Orange Registry health exam for possible long-term health problems related to exposure. VA also offers health care, disability compensation, and other benefits to eligible Veterans for certain disease conditions, as well as benefits for children of Vietnam Veterans who have spina bifida.

[pg 305] Back on the Barb, two new officers were waiting for me. Jim introduced me to Lieutenant Chuck Hill and Ensign William Masek, both fresh out of sub school. After a few pleasantries we got down to fitting them into their submarine niche. "Chuck, since you are relieving Dick Gibson, we'll assign you as assistant torpedo, gunnery, and rockets officer. Bill, we must change your name [pg 306] because we already have a Bill Walker. To avoid confusion, particularly in emergencies, I now christen thee 'Willy.' You are our new commissary officer." His face fell. "Willy, I know you want to head a department that you feel is more important. I've been commissary officer in both destroyers and submarines. Let me tell you something, that job is most important for the morale of the crew. Excellent food, well prepared, and we'll have a happy crew. Furthermore, learn fast, for your life may depend on it. If Barb gets stranded, captured, or sunk, and we are survivors, I'm going to tell the Japanese that I'm the commissary officer and you're the captain. So you better know more about your job than I do. You'll also be the assistant first lieutenant under Walker, taking care of the hull, damage control, et cetera. Glad to have you both aboard; you'll not be bored."



Competence and coolness exhibited while being harassed in such a way gave some confidence to shipmates knowing that someone could be expected to 'show their mettle' in a stressful situation.

• • Clam Chowder [New England Style] From Navy cookbook 1920 **CLAM. CHOWDER** 30 lbs. potatoes 2 lbs. milk 3 gals. clams 1 oz. thyme 5 lbs. salt pork or bacon 5 lbs. tomatoes 5 lbs. onions 5 lbs. flour Water sufficient to make 10 gallons



and reserve the stock. Dice the salt pork or bacon and place in the pan with a little water and fry until the meat becomes slightly brown; then add the onions, finely chopped, and cook for 5 minutes; add the flour and stir well. Remove from the fire and add to the potato stock and simmer slowly. If soft-shell clams are used the bellies are removed and the tough parts are added ~the potato stock together with the liquid, onions and meat, and allowed to simmer for 30 minutes. Fifteen minutes before serving add the potatoes, clam bellies, seasoning, and pepper and salt, and a small pinch of thyme. If the clams ar tough they should be finely chopped and cooked for 30 minutes in the stock. This chowder may be greatly improved if the milk is added just before serving. Tomatoes may or may not be used with this chowder.

Peel and dice the potatoes and then boil in slightly salted water until about three-quarters cooked, drain

The War On Beards, Hair Today-Gone Tomorrow **Navy Nixes No-Shave Cuts**

Navy Times Oct 2019 - Synopsis- Since the days of Admiral Zumwalt as CNO in late 1969-early 70's who advocated for sailors to be allowed beards, and leaving most of the discretion to local commands as to what was acceptable, there have been many regulation changes about beards. In the submarine force the advent of emergency air breathing systems has made the necessity for no beards to interfere with mask sealing a definitive requirement.

Elsewhere there has been some allowance for men with certain skin conditions making shaving somewhat a problem to allow beards on a case-by-case basis. And as reported in the last issue of CB some few religious exemptions are allowed.

A program is now underway to train these problem sailors in how to shave in a way to minimize or correct their skin conditions. Many of these sailors are African-Americans who seem to be more prevalent with the main skin problem. The final outcome is that only a very few men, on the basis of religious practices, will be allowed to wear beards. Large PDF file of the full mag
