

It is my opinion that this has become a major matter for many Sabalo vets. A number of men have already passed away from conditions and diseases that could be presumed to be caused by Agent Orange. So I have placed the matter on Page 1. - ed.

AGENT ORANGE EXPLAINED

Recent communications with a number of shipmates reveals that many have little knowledge of what Agent Orange is and what implications come from the extensive use of it during the Viet Nam War. During the most intensive period of its use, from August 1965 to 1971, DOD sprayed 11.22 million gallons of Agent Orange in Vietnam, with about 3 gallons per acre sprayed undiluted. DOD has little information available on the number or extent of personnel exposure to herbicides in Vietnam. Four herbicides were used: --Agent Orange (a mixture of 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T); --Agent Purple (a similar mixture of 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T that contained a different form of 2,4,5-T--it was replaced by Agent Orange in 1964); -- Agent White (a mixture of 2,4-D and Picloram); and --Agent Blue (cacodylic acid). A Defense official said that pesticides malathion and DDT were the other principal sprayed chemicals used in Vietnam; they were used throughout the war for mosquito control. Malathion was sprayed by aircraft, and DDT was applied by back pack and paint brush. The official said that no information is readily available on the quantities used in Vietnam. Malathion is still used domestically for insect control. However, in 1972 EPA cancelled all except public health and quarantine uses of DDT because of its persistence, biomagnification, and toxicological effects.

The full period the U.S. military sprayed herbicides over Vietnam, from 1962 to 1971, was to strip the thick jungle canopy that could conceal opposition forces, to destroy crops that those forces might depend on, and to clear tall grasses and bushes from the perimeters of US base camps and outlying fire-support bases. Mixtures of 2,4-dichlorophenoxyacetic acid (2,4-D), 2,4,5-trichlorophenoxyacetic acid (2,4,5-T), picloram, and cacodylic acid made up the bulk of the herbicides sprayed. The main chemical mixture sprayed was Agent Orange, a 50:50 mixture of 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T. At the time of the spraying, 2,3,7,8-tetrachlorodibenzo-p-dioxin (TCDD), the most toxic form of dioxin, was an unintended contaminant generated during the production of 2,4,5-T and so was present in Agent Orange and some other formulations sprayed in Vietnam. According to a National Academy of Sciences report, about 18.85 million gallons of herbicides were sprayed during the 1962 to 1971 period. The Academy became the main source of scientific study, and the main authority reporting to Congress on the problem and its implications. —cont on pg 3

The Congessional committee appointed to investigate was also tasked with comparing exposures among three military populations that served in Vietnam: troops on the ground, Brown Water Navy personnel (meaning service on the rivers of VN), and Blue Water Navy personnel. Since the 1970s, IOM committees and other groups have attempted to reconstruct Vietnam veterans' potential exposure to Agent Orange and dioxin. Given the lack of exposure data on ground troops, the uncertainty of exposure models, and the limited knowledge about exposure among BWN veterans, the committee concluded that it was not possible to make quantitative exposure comparisons among the three military populations of interest to the VA. Therefore, the committee evaluated the plausibility of exposure of the three populations to Agent Orange and dioxin via various mechanisms and routes. Several plausible exposure pathways and routes of exposure to Agent Orange–associated dioxin in the three populations were identified. Plausible pathways and routes of exposure of Blue Water Navy personnel include inhalation and dermal contact with aerosols from spraying operations that occurred at or near the coast when Blue Water Navy ships were nearby, contact with marine water, and uses of potable water prepared from distilled marine water.

Large US Navy ships—such as aircraft carriers, cruisers, and destroyers [and submarines, generally ignored in all <u>reports</u>]—had their own distillation systems to produce potable-water and distribution systems that included watertreatment processes. The issue of distillation of marine water is important because the VAO committee for Update 2008 found that Blue Water Navy veterans could have been exposed to dioxin via contaminated potable water. This conclusion was based on an Australian Department of Veterans Affairs report that determined that Royal Australian Navy personnel who served offshore in Vietnam were exposed to Agent Orange–associated dioxin because the distillation systems aboard the ships were thought to be able to concentrate the the marine water, distilled potable water would be a plausible pathway of exposure dioxin in marine water into the potable water during the evaporative process. If Agent Orange–associated dioxin was present in marine water, distilled potable water would be a plausible pathway of exposure for Blue Water Navy veterans.

The early comprehensive 2011 committee concluded that, qualitatively, ground troops and Brown Water Navy veterans had more plausible pathways of exposure to Agent Orange–associated dioxin than did Blue Water Navy veterans. But one exposure mechanism was specific to Blue Water Navy ships: possible dioxin contamination of potable water from onboard distillation plants. However, without information on the dioxin concentrations in the marine feed water, it is impossible to determine whether Blue Water Navy personnel were exposed to Agent Orange–associated dioxin via ingestion, dermal contact, or inhalation of potable water.

History of Congressional Action

Because of complaints from returning Vietnam veterans about their own health and that of their children combined with emerging toxicologic evidence of adverse effects of phenoxy herbicides and TCDD, the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine was asked to perform a comprehensive evaluation of scientific and medical information regarding the health effects of exposure to Agent Orange, other herbicides used in Vietnam, and the various components of those herbicides, including TCDD. Updated evaluations were conducted every two years to review newly available literature and draw conclusions from the overall evidence. Veterans and Agent Orange: Update 11 (2018) examines peer-reviewed scientific reports concerning associations between various health outcomes and exposure to TCDD and other chemicals in the herbicides used in Vietnam that were published between September 30, 2014, and December 31, 2017, and integrates this information with the previously established evidence database.

The VA received the first claims asserting conditions related to Agent Orange in 1977. Since then, Vietnam-era veterans have sought relief from Congress and through the judicial system. Beginning in 1979, Congress enacted several laws to determine whether exposure to Agent Orange in Vietnam was associated with possible long-term health effects and certain disabilities.

See report dated 2014 for synopsis: <u>https://sgp.fas.org/crs/misc/R43790.pdf</u> -Cont. on pg 4 **AGENT ORANGE**—cont. from page 3 In 1991, Congress passed Public Law 102-4, the **Agent Orange Act of 1991**, which established a process for determining which illnesses among Vietnam veterans should be "presumed" to be due to herbicide exposure. It also contracted The NAS Institute of Medicine to provide biennial reports to the VA with updates. In 2005 it publicly released the fifth biennial update which was based upon updated NAS reports in 1996, 1998, 2000, and 2002. This caused the VA to expand the list of presumptive diseases and other expanded definitions of affected persons.

The **Blue Water Navy (BWN) Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019** (PL 116-23) extended the presumption of herbicide exposure, such as Agent Orange, to Veterans who served in the offshore waters of the Republic of Vietnam between Jan. 9, 1962 and May 7, 1975. Beginning Jan. 1, 2020, Veterans who served as far as 12 nautical miles from the shore of Vietnam, or who had service in the Korean Demilitarized Zone, are presumed to have been exposed to herbicides, such as Agent Orange, and may be entitled to service connection for any of the 14 conditions related to herbicide exposure.

The **PACT Act of 2021** is perhaps the largest health care and benefit expansion in VA history. The full name of the law is **The Sergeant First Class (SFC) Heath Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act.**

The PACT Act adds these changes:

- Expands and extends eligibility for VA health care for Veterans with toxic exposures and Veterans of the Vietnam, Gulf War, and post-9/11 eras
- Adds 20+ more presumptive conditions for burn pits, Agent Orange, and other toxic exposures
- Adds more presumptive-exposure locations for Agent Orange and radiation

Agent Orange Registry Health Exam for Veterans

- Free to eligible Veterans and no co-payment
- Not a disability compensation exam or required for other VA benefits
- Enrollment in VA's health care system not necessary
- Based on Veterans' recollection of service, not on their military records
- Will not confirm exposure to Agent Orange

The Navy is offering up to \$75,000 in enlistment bonuses

to get more sailors 18 Jun 2023—the Navy announced a series of new enlistment bonuses and eligibility rules for them, aiming to "attract the highest quality of recruits and ensure Fleet readiness." There are a number of different bonuses, but by far the largest one goes to those who work in nuclear fields, training to operate or maintain the Navy's nuclear-powered surface vessels and submarines. That includes roles such as Electrician's Mate Nuclear (EMN), Electronics Technician Nuclear (ETN) or Machinist's Mate Nuclear (MMN). They can get a \$75,000 enlistment bonus. 2023 Military Pay Raise the Largest in 20 Years

Under the plan, active-duty troops and drilling Guard and reserve members will receive a 4.6% pay raise. That pay raise represents about \$1,300 more over the course of the year for many junior troops and \$2,500 for senior enlisted and junior officers, was included in the 2023 National Defense Authorization Act, or NDAA. It was signed into law 23 Dec 2022 by President Biden.

The 2023 raise is joined by a more than 11% bump to Basic Allowance for Subsistence rates. Still, the 2023 military pay boost does not match the pace of inflation, which sat at 7.7% in October, the last month for which data is available at press time.

Pentagon Accounting Error Provides Extra \$6.2 Billion for Ukraine Military Aid

The Pentagon said it overestimated the value of the weapons it has sent to Ukraine by \$6.2 billion over the past two years.

A detailed review of the accounting error found that the military services used replacement costs rather than the book value of equipment sent to Ukraine. There was an error of \$3.6 billion in the current fiscal year and \$2.6 billion in the 2022 fiscal year, which ended last Sept. 30. As a result, the department now has additional money in its coffers to use to support Ukraine as it pursues its counteroffensive against Russia.

Lawrence Savadkin., LT on Tang escaped when she went down. He later was Sabalo's CO during 1951-53.


<u>A story postponed (twice] from past issues</u> A tale told by CO Larry Savadkin about a post-war visit he made to Japan. [My recount is third-hand. –ed.]

It was related to me that Savadkin retained some hatred for the Japanese from poor treatment of POW's. At some point he contacted some Japanese [not sure what position they held] who he had accompany him to the wooden buildings where the Tang survivors and many others were held. These Japanese vehemently denied this was a POW facility because it was a bunch of broken down buildings and without services.

Savadkin was able to correctly orient himself and find the location because there were high-tension electric lines running overhead that had towers with a particular kind of construction. Something etched in his memory from looking out the window each day and seeing them.

The Japanese accompanying him still denied this was the location of his prison camp. But to further prove he was positive, he took them inside the building were he was kept. And the final proof came when he took up a floor board and there was the ultimate revelation. Some parcels from U.S. CARE packages were found were he had stowed them during his captivity. Divers find wreckage of century old sub "hiding in plain sight" - 16 April 2023—Connecticut recreational divers have discovered the wreckage of an experimental submarine that was built in **1907** and later scuttled in Long Island Sound. Originally named the *Lake, she* was built by millionaire Simon Lake and his Bridgeport-based Lake Torpedo Boat Company in hopes of winning a competition for a U.S. Navy contract .The Defender was an experimental vessel, with wheels to move along the sea bottom and a door that allowed divers to be released underwater. The company lost that competition and Lake then tried refitting the boat for minesweeping, salvage and rescue work, *renaming it the Defender*. But he never found a buyer. It was a well-known sub and was even visited by Amelia Earhart in 1929. The ship has some protections under what is known as the <u>Abandoned Shipwreck Act</u>, a 1988 law that would allow it to be treated as an archaeological or historical site instead of a commercial property to be salvaged. AUKUS—Former Australian PM Says Subs 'Worst Deal in

All History' 15 Mar 2023 "Keating said on Wednesday that his country's recently announced agreement to obtain three nuclear-powered submarines from the U.S. "must be the worst deal in all history."

"The only way the Chinese could threaten Australia or attack it is on land. That is, they bring an armada of troop ships with a massive army to occupy us," Keating said at a National Press Club event, according to The Associated Press. "This is not possible for the Chinese to do." [how naïve?! -ed.]

He called the agreement, expected to cost Canberra between 268 billion and 368 billion Australian dollars, or \$178 billion and \$245 billion, the worst international decision by the Australian Labor Party in more than 100 years. Keating led the party in the early 1990s.

"The idea that we need American submarines to protect us," he said, adding, "Three are going to protect us from the might of China. Really? I mean, the rubbish of it. Both Russia and China have attempted to develop aircraft carriers. China has 3, but this report will only mention the Russian carrier Admiral Kuznetsov, the only one they have. Bow ramps have been inefficient because they don't work well with heavier aircraft, thus limiting fuel and weapon loads and reducing mission capability. Ck this series of news to see the status.—ed. 

Nautical Terminology — What is HOGGING?

The terms "hogging", "hogged" and "hog" refer to the sagging of the bow and sterm of a ship relative to its midships section. A ship that has experienced hogging is said to be hogged. Instead of showing a flat, level hull line, a hogged ship is "curved", with the bow and stern lower than the center of the ship.

Hogging is generally found in older wooden vessels, due to the natural weaknesses in their structure. However, a small degree of hog is not unheard of in iron and steel ships. Hogging occurs because the bow and stern of the ship, while carrying a considerable amount of heavy equipment, posses relatively little buoyancy. The center of the ship, on the other hand, possesses a great deal of bouyancy and may be quite light-weight if the ship is not loaded with heavy cargo or ballast. This unequal distribution of forces, with great weights but little buoyancy fore and aft, and little weight but great buoyancy amidships, leads to deformation of the hull.

We both had 3 shots of vaccine, She had Pfizer and I had Moderna thinking one might work, but It finally caught up to us.

I did 5 days and Paula took it 3 before side effects were too much. It didn't seem to do anything, and after 3 weeks we still had moderate lasting problems. But we both never really got loose of it.

In worse condition, Paula went to hospital on th 28th of Dec and was given IV antibiotics suspecting it might be pneumonia, but without any actual test results to prove what was causing her lung and breathing problems. Finally, the doc figured it must be viral and said she might as well go home to finish recovery without any meds.

Beginning in December she had 16 days either spiking a fever for short periods or having it last for hours. On 2 Jan she had a temperature of 103.6 - way too high for old folks - And feeling very serious about her condition, she wouldn't let me drive her to the hospital, and called the ambulance. She spent 3 days in the hospital

Meanwhile, my symptoms moderated somewhat, but Paula was again prescribed Paxlovid in February by her oncologist and did the whole five days of pills this time.

The total time we felt symptoms was almost 4 months..

While she was in the emergency room, a man was continually talking loudly with his cell phone. He kept saying, "I'm 302-ing myself" to whomever it was on the call. My wife later asked one of the nurses what does it mean to '302 your self'. 'It is a hospital code for being admitted to the psychiatric ward', she was told.

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin ordered a number of improvements in access to mental health care to reduce suicides in the military, but held off on endorsing more controversial recommendations to restrict gun and ammunition purchases by young troops, sending them to another panel for study.

An independent committee in late February recommended that the Defense Department implement a series of gun safety measures, including waiting periods for the purchase of firearms and ammunition by service members on military property and *raising the minimum age for service members to buy guns and ammunition to 25.*


